Resident Sentiment Towards Tourism: Cowichan Region

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Introduction

Residents' sentiment toward tourism is generally a measurement of whether residents feel that the perceived benefits of tourism outweigh the perceived costs of tourism. Research has shown that resident sentiment can be influenced by factors such as (a) destination's stage of developmentⁱ, (b) place attachmentⁱⁱ, (c) proximity to tourism centresⁱⁱⁱ, and (d) economic dependency on tourism^{iv}. Practically, place attachment is linked with the length of residency in the destination, proximity is linked to transportation pathways (e.g., increased traffic) as well as geographic proximity to places where tourists gather, and economic dependency is characterized by being personally employed or having a household member employed in the industry (including business ownership).

Resident sentiment towards tourism gained greater prominence for destinations during the COVID-19 pandemic. During the early stages of the pandemic, there was reluctance to host visitors from international destinations that were already experiencing high infection rates. By May 2020 most British Columbians were concerned or very concerned about hosting visitors from international destinations (91%), the United States (91%), and other Canadian provinces (83%). Concerns related to hosting visitors waned as British Columbians and others accessed vaccinations (and boosters) and travel-related public health measures were lifted. However, as recently as November 2022 British Columbians were still somewhat or very concerned about host international visitors (57%) and US visitors (52%).

The importance of understanding resident sentiment has also been linked to overtourism. Residents in communities that experience high ratios of visitors to residents are the most likely to resent tourism development^v. Moreover, the seasonal influx of visitors can result in negative perceptions as residents experience episodic over-tourism. As noted above, previous research suggests that individuals who live closer to the tourism zone are more likely to view tourism negatively unless there the benefits (e.g., financial or access to amenities) outweigh the costs.

As the tourism industry continues to recover from the pandemic-related downturn it is increasingly important to determine how residents feel about tourism and visitors. Tourism is inherently a social exchange between hosts (residents) and guests (visitors) and the nature of this exchange influences how residents feel about tourism and how visitors feel about a destination. Therefore, destinations (and DMOs) must monitor how residents feel about tourism, tourism development, and the use of local resources for tourism purposes. The purpose of this study was to better understand how residents of the Cowichan Tourism Region (Malahat and Shawnigan Lake to Ladysmith and Yellow Point) feel about tourism and how likely they were to recommend their community and the region as a destination to visit.

Methods

Using convenience sampling and an online survey, data for this study were collected from December 2022 to mid-March 2023. The survey instrument used a validated scale^{vi} of positive and negative value statements about the costs and benefits of tourism. Additional questions focused on factors known to influence sentiment including (a) length of residency, (b) community of residence, (c) economic dependence on tourism, and (d) valuing of personal travel. Questions focused on potential infrastructure development (e.g., trail development) were also included. Using the net promoter approach,

Data collection was done through multiple channels including (a) face-to-face intercept, (b) distribution of cards with a link to the survey, (c) distribution of posters, (d) placement of ballot boxes (visitors were asked to provide their emails) at local businesses, (e) advertisements

placed in regional magazines, (f) social media ads on Facebook and Instagram, and (g) a press release shared by Vancouver Island University.

Face-to-face data collection was done in several communities and events throughout the region including Duncan, Chemainus, Ladysmith, Lake Cowichan, Shawnigan Lake, and Cowichan Bay. Researchers frequented public spaces (e.g., Transfer Beach Park on a sunny day) or community recreation centres for events like hockey and curling competitions.

Data Analysis

The online survey was started by 412 residents of the Cowichan Region; however, once incomplete surveys were removed the final sample included 338 participants. Surveys removed (n=74) included those where participants skipped more than 50% of the questions on the survey. The data from the final sample (n=338) were analyzed, and the results are presented in the next section; however, as participants did not answer all questions the identified sample size (n) may be less than 338.

Sample Profile

Region (sample size)

The Cowichan Region includes several larger municipalities that each have unique characteristics, tourism assets, and visitor patterns. Participants representing 20 different communities participated; however, for analysis, participant communities were recoded into larger geographic spaces. Table 1 identifies the five regions created and the communities included in each.





Figure 3: Average Years of Residency

Most participants (92.3%) were permanent residents of the Region, felt that tourism was somewhat to very important to their quality of life (average 8/10; Figure 1), did not work in the tourism industry (84.1%), and did not have a household member working in the industry (84.8%). On average participants were 56 years old (Figure 2), had lived in the Region for 23 years (Figure 3), and took 6 domestic trips and 1 international trip per year.



Figure 2: Residents' Ages (Groups)

Results

The results section is divided into several sub-sections that reflect the different questions that study participants were asked. The first section focused on how residents responded to the value and belief statements about tourism. Sub-section two includes results related to comfort in welcoming visitors to their communities and how supportive they are of increasing trails and pathways for cycling and the number of large events hosted in the Region. The third section explores the net promoter scores that residents gave their own communities and the Region overall. There final two sub-sections contain the open-ended comments made by participants.

Residents' Level of Agreement with Tourism Value & Belief Statements

Participants were asked about the extent to which they agreed or disagreed with statements about the benefits and costs of tourism. Overall residents of the Cowichan Region (81%) agreed with the statement that *Overall tourism is good for my community*. People living in Duncan (88%) had the highest level of agreement and those in North Cowichan (71%) had the lowest level of agreement. Residents also agreed that tourism benefited their community by; (a) providing more to do (69%), (b) enhancing services (75%), (c) enhancing their community's image (82%), and providing good employment (72%). Figures 4 - 8 illustrate levels of agreement on each of the *benefits of tourism* statements by residents in each region.




Figure 4: Residents' Agreement that Tourism is Good for Their Community







Figure 6: Residents' Agreement that Tourism Results in Enhances Services







Figure 7: Residents' Agreement that Sports Tourism Enhances Their Community's Image





Figure 9: Residents' Agreement that the Cost of Tourism Outweighs the Benefits

Residents perceived that tourism was good for their communities overall and most across the Cowichan Region (64%) disagreed that the *costs of tourism outweighed the benefits* (Figure 9) and 66% disagreed that *tourism is responsible for Cowichan's housing crisis* (Figure 10). However, there were some concerns about the impacts of tourism within the Region.




Figure 11: Residents' Agreement that Tourism Reduces the Quality of Life in Community





Figure 13: Residents' Agreement that Tourism Damages Parks and Open Spaces

Statistically significant differences between communities were found related to concerns about tourism's impact on quality of life, crowding, and damage to parks and open spaces. More residents of Duncan (79%) disagreed that *tourism reduced the quality of life in their community* (Figure 11). Just over half of residents from Cowichan Lake (54%), North Cowichan (54%), and Ladysmith and Area (56%) disagreed that *tourism uses too many public resources*, whereas 71% of residents from Duncan disagreed (Figure 12). Residents of Cowichan Lake (23%) had the highest level of agreement that their *community is crowded because of tourists*; whereas only 6% of residents from Duncan agreed. Residents from Cowichan Lake (37%) also had the highest level of agreement that *tourism causes damage to parks and open spaces*. However, 28% of all residents in the Cowichan Region agreed that tourism is damaging parks and open spaces (Figure 13).

Figure 12: Residents' Agreement that Tourism Uses too Many Public Resources




Figure 14: Residents' Agreement that Tourism Increases the Cost of Goods and Services

Thirty-three percent of Duncan residents and 32% of residents in Ladysmith and Area agreed that *tourism increases the costs of goods and services*. Those living in North Cowichan (25%) and South Cowichan (22%) had the lowest level of agreement (Figure 14).

Residents' Support for Welcoming Visitors and Increasing Tourism Development




Figure 15: Average Level of Comfort with Welcoming Visitors

Participants of this study were asked to indicate on a scale of 0 - 10, how comfortable they were with welcoming visitors and how supportive they were of specific types of tourism development. Analysis revealed that residents in the Cowichan Region (M = 7.8) were comfortable with welcoming visitors. Residents in all sub-regions had average scores higher than the neutral mid-point of five (Figure 15).




Figure 16: Average Level of Support for Increasing the Number of Events and Trails

On average was low to moderate support for increasing the number of large events (M= 6.5), mountain bike trails (M= 6.4), and paved trails (M= 6.4). The lowest level of support for increasing the number of mountain bike trails was in North Cowichan (M= 5.8) and the highest level was in Duncan (M= 6.6). The results for each community are presented in Figure 16.

Net Promoter Scores and Reasons for Ranking

Net promoter scores (NPS) are typically considered an indication of satisfaction and loyalty. There are two parts to measuring NPS, asking how likely participants are to recommend the destination/product/service and why they provided that recommendation. When applied in the context of residents it is even more vital to examine the comments as residents may be reflecting their views of hosting visitors as much as their pride in their community. The NPS is calculated by subtracting the percentage of detractors (rank 0-6) from the percentage of promoters (rank 9-10). Passives (rank 7-8) are those who are not a threat to your destination as they are unlikely to speak poorly about your destination, but they are also unlikely to recommend it.





Figure 17: Net Promoter Scores for Each Community by its Residents

With a NPS of 44, the residents of the Cowichan Region clearly indicated their pride in their home communities. Residents of Ladysmith and Area (63) had the largest NPS and those in North Cowichan (38) lowest (Figure 17). Figure 18 illustrates the percentage of detractors, passives, and promoters in each sub-region.

Comments by participants were divided by NPS categories but were not sorted by the community; however, some clearly identify the sub-region that they are speaking to (e.g. tubing in Cowichan Lake). Detractors (Table 2) made note of crowding, not wanting visitors, homelessness in the community, and the negative impacts of visitors. Passives (Table 3) provided a mixture of positive (beautiful landscape) and negative statements (homelessness and negative impacts). They also compared their communities to other Island destinations and found them lacking. Supporters' (Table 4) comments illustrate a very strong sense of civic pride based on the natural beauty of their communities.

- Duncan... our image is bad with all the homelessness in our area. People who visit here for the first time are turned off. We need to deal with this first before we can promote tourism.
- Hard to find accommodation
- Homeless people have taken over our community
- I am neutral on inviting friends or colleagues to my community.
- I am not in favor of rampant tourism.
- I do not give recommendations at all, for anything, for any reason.
- I don't feel the need to promote visitors to come to my community. If they want to take the time to research potential travel destinations, they can find out for themselves if they want to come to my community or not
- I love visitors to my home.
- I moved to the Island to live in a small uncrowded community. The fewer people that know about this area, hopefully the fewer that will come.
- i prefer quite streets
- If a friend is coming to visit ME I will show them around. However we need to STOP inviting anyone to our SMALL land mass. Currently benefitting some highend business owners and no one else.
- It is a shabby seaside and very small community with no parking.
- It is too expensive and there are lots of other nicer places.
- It's a pissing contest between CVRD and MNC. Neither have the best interests of residents at heart
- It's better to come in summer, winter is boring
- My city sucks. It's full of homeless and addicts.
- My friends are cyclists not atv or motorbike or car racers. Tourism from atvs etc is damaging to the land, dangerous for pedestrians and horse riders, and noisy





Figure 19: Net Promoter Scores for the Cowichan Region by Sub-Region

Comments below are linked to the NPS ranking related to the Cowichan Region in general. Several participants simply indicated that their answers remained the same as those for their community – those were deleted. Comments were divided by NPS categories but were not sorted by sub-region. Detractors (Table 5) made note of crowding and that their community was better than other areas of the Cowichan Region. Passives (Table 6) once again provided a mixture of positive and negative statements. Supporters' (Table 7) comments illustrate a very strong sense of regional pride based on natural beauty and the feeling that there were a lot of activities and attractions available in the Cowichan Region.

Table 8: General Comments Made by Residents of the Cowichan Region

- There is still so much untapped potential when it comes to tourism in our • community. More quality lodging just in the Duncan area alone would ease the compression on what would otherwise be open to longer-term rentals, the availability of which would help with attracting qualified service industry workers into the region. There also still exists a lack of understanding of my rad ways the healthy tourism sector can improve the lives of the residents. Tourism is essentially a form of export industry with the advent of goods and services being consumed on location. Tourism paves the way for other economic benefits, as each tourism dollar spent in the region tends to spin multiple times and remain in the region. Also, social and cultural benefits are many, as tourism enriches both the visitors and the hosts through shared experiences. In the grander scheme of things, Tourism promotes greater intercultural connections and thus plays a significant part in deepening our understanding of the complex world we live in. There is no doubt that broadened horizons and understandings through tourism and travel aid in promoting diplomatic solutions to many things that ail our world. Tourism is a vehicle of peace.
- A bike path from Lake Cowichan to Honeymoon Bay. (Or around the lake. A bypass for logging roads through Lake Cowichan. Improve the highway to Port Renfrew and onto Sooke.
- Additional training is required to prepare tourism workers to greet and communicate with visitors appropriately
- As biking is becoming more and more popular there needs to be more trails for recreational biking not just mountain biking without forgetting that recreational equestrians are here too and are an economic staple for the valley.
- As I grew up on the island, the things changed a lot here, if more tourism can make community develop more, then yes plz .
- As much as I believe tourism is an important part of the region's economic • development, I believe that it shouldn't be the sole focus. As we saw with the pandemic and other events happening in Canada ie. floods, fires, protests that can severely impact tourism we need a diverse marketplace that will aid in sustaining people should tourism be cut off for one reason or another. For example: Added value manufacturing is important as well as agriculture so that if supply is disrupted we still are able to produce what we need. There can be crossover interests in tourism but those kinds of operations have to be solidly sustainable for the stability of our society. The cost of land is of primary concern and having the housing to support local workers who would like to have a hope of one day owning their own home. As much as I have enjoyed being part of the island and calling it my home, I have seen over my lifetime how it is a playground for the rich and famous and is becoming less friendly to those who's aim is to live here and make a life. Governing bodies need to be constantly looking at checks and balances that will help the average person to not just survive here but thrive here. Part of that is certainly going to come in the form of tourism jobs but how tourism affects the underpinnings of keeping a stable economy I don't quite know or understand. I would like to see a focus on

keeping our natural resources to be used by local manufacturers and not sent as raw logs to Asia. That might not be related to tourism but if we want to maintain the beauty of our resources and still harvest responsibly we need to keep working towards supporting workers/businesses here not shipping our raw logs out to other countries to process. Basically I think it comes down to we can't have it both ways...natural beauty = tourism, harvesting responsibly = local stability, processing resources = stable jobs for times when there are downturns in tourism.

- Better accessibility. Often times trail heads / areas overflowing with vehicles. Ie • Skutz falls. Secondly there is HUGE undeveloped potential for world class ATV / Motorcross trails (old forest service roads) in around the CVRD. Locals utilize them with or without permission and it's is highly frowned upon for some reason. Take an example from Okanogan Valley / Kelowna where ATV areas are promoted, permitted, and monitored for safe enjoyability for many. Plus is a beacon for outdoor enthusiasts of all interests. There is this perception in CVRD that motor sports are bad. Most people I know that do backcountry motor sports are extremely responsible, environmentally in tune and respect the places they go. Yes they make mud, but they also pick up garbage, report poachers, fires, etc. Yes, some folks make a huge mess areas close to town which gives the rest of us a bad name. Put some money or support to create some safe unloading areas away from population centers, monitor usage and work on supporting those that use it to create a destination. But considering the farce surrounding the speedway this valley is not supportive to ALL interests. But CVRD wants to cut trees and get easy money. We have millions of dollars of FSRs being under utilized. But forestry comes first on crown / leased land. South Island could use a Legal, safe, non-intrusive ATV / Motorcross / 4x4 area....increase local sales of vehicles when people know they have a local area to play. Hotels / campgrounds / etc...food Suggestion. Areas behind Mt Sicker / Mt Provost / Lake cowichan have ample secluded areas to put a trail head to head out to extensive decommissioned, Under utilized FSRs. Some also want it all to themselves. Never mind it's usually a free-for-all for parking not safe for everyone and no enforcement of rules especially on the weekends when it's needed because bye-law officers usually don't work on the weekends
- I want my community to be charming and have more amenities but I don't like how Country Grocer hikes up the prices during the busy times and that the beaches are becoming more crowded
- I would hope we don't promote specific types of tourism that may be harmful to the environment and ruin what we have here. For example, promoting the Cowichan region as a mountain biking destination (like Cumberland) I feel would be detrimental to our less developed mountains and ruin quiet areas. I want quiet spaces to stay quiet.
- I would like more walking trails. Such as along Mill Bay Road.
- I would like one of the benefits of tourism to be an increase in active transportation. Still too many of our regions are not well connected and even our streets are not 'easy' to manage. If folks are staying out where I live, to make it to the Saturday market is technically a lovely 20 minute walk, but only the locals really know the short cuts that make the walk actually more pleasant. Walk and cycling people! We live in the 'Warm Land' - we should be out moving!

- It would be nice to have more "be a tourist on your own island" guided bus tours, particularly for seniors, but also for anyone who'd rather leave the driving to someone else so they could enjoy the gorgeous scenery and with a guide to talk about interesting history, etc. Tourism shouldn't just be for folks from afar.
- It's a critical industry and one we should value. However it does need to be managed sensitively regarding impact on residents. Input should always be sought for major changes/developments.
- It's a fine balance. I don't want this place to have hiking trails like Deep Cove, in Vancouver where I'm from lined with people single-file. But I do think this area is special and I love to share it with visitors.
- Just that Thetis Island and Yellow Point are 'hidden' gems!
- Keep growing the community while keep the local culture diversity
 - Keep it nature oriented not gimmicky and not over developed. For example, there are already too many trails on Maple Mountain don't make more! Bicycle friendly roads with shoulders to ride safely on. Trails like CVT or TCT don't need to be paved! Safe bicycle parking places in towns for bicycle tourists who are passing through. Can always find places to lock bike up but with all the gear (such as camping gear, clothing, etc) attached I don't like to leave my bike. As a long distance cycle tourist, I spend a lot of time in towns where I feel my bicycle and gear are safe, grocery shopping, drug stores, restaurants, bike shops, tourist shops, etc. Bicycle valets like Victoria and Vancouver have in summer would be great. I would use it and cycle tourists would be drawn to Duncan and other towns if they had it.
- Keep our town safe while increase tourism

Garbage, soil compaction and erosion and dog waste are problems, as well as an underestimation of the fire hazard in these forests.

The second matter that I'd address, is that I travel 4-6 times per year for work, not tourism, I travel 1 every other or every third year for tourism, I travel every year to visit family in the US. The purpose of the travel wasn't didn't have enough breadth, but while traveling for work, or to visit family touristy activities do take place.

- We are so fortunate to live here, I'm happy to share
- We do not have enough accommodation options. Locally, since Deer Lodge closed, there are not enough accommodation in Mill Bay or Cobble Hill. We are missing out on lots of tourism with the Malahat skywalk so close by and yet few places for tourist to stay in Mill, Bay, or Cobble Hill.
- We enthusiastically welcome tourism as an asset to our communities. We hope that in planning for the increasing demand on our tourism infrastructure, authorities prioritize the maintenance of what makes this place special - keeping it wild and beautiful. Extra care paid to providing amenities to ensure that an influx of visitors doesn't spoil the quality of life for residents, wildlife and other visitors is of paramount importance to our family. Amenities such as garbage receptacles + collection, public washroom facilities, safe parking, litter pickup, paving sidewalks or maintaining road shoulders in areas where summer tourism creates an uptick in pedestrian use, appropriate allocation of funding to law enforcement to handle the uptick in problems arising from rowdy summer visitors etc.

- We have a great community centre . We have a local orchestra and a band as well as many other music events for activities .

- We need more Pull Out Rest Stops. We need clearer signs for Tourist attractions, Emergency Hospital, RCMP etc. and.....Camping /RV spots upgraded.
- We need more tourism revenues, please promote the community.
 - We need more tourist accommodation. Where I live there are no legal short term vacation rentals. We need good bylaws for short term rentals. Currently, there are no CVRD policies, and many residents 'hide' from ByLaw enforcement. - We need our privacy
- We need progressive, sustainable, earth friendly, inclusive tourism product to be built.
- We need to be mindful about bringing in hordes of tourist such as what happens in Lake Cowichan every year. Tourism is fine, as long as it doesn't harm the environment and the community
- We need to move away from logging near towns if we ever want tourism to succeed. Clear cut logging is ugly and unsustainable in addition to robbing the wildlife of their natural habitat. Until we can see the value of mature forests that are accessible to the public I really doubt that lake Cowichan will ever be on the tourism map for anything other than water sports and drinking heavily.

- While I am in favor of tourism, I believe viewing tourism as an environmentally friendly industry is inaccurate as it is based on unnecessary travel and the spending of excess wealth for the sake of leisure.

- While I love the natural beauty of our region, I think that placement of new trails/parking lots/access to wild spaces must be done thoughtfully (also in conjunction with local Indigenous communities) to reduce impact on sensitive habitats and important cultural spaces.
- Youbou has one of the least developed Tourism plans. I feel strongly that we should be developing a plan and get it marketed.

Conclusions & Recommendations

Residents of the Cowichan Region have a strong sense of local and regional pride. They are generally supportive of tourism in their communities and the region. However, there are concerns in some communities about crowding, impacts on the natural environment and overuse of local resources. Tourism Cowichan and local community planners should monitor these perceptions and actual levels of crowding and impact to ensure that residents remain supportive of tourism.

Comments provided by residents illustrate the high level of importance that residents give to the natural environment of the Cowichan Region. Detractors were clearly concerned about the impacts of tourism on that landscape. Tourism Cowichan can use the comments as local testimonials about the Region and as an indication of what is important to locals.

Residents' sentiment is a vital component of successful tourism planning and management. It is recommended that Tourism Cowichan consider continuing to monitor how residents of the Cowichan Region experience tourism.

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
